He said, you run, no I ain't been runnin' an' they, 10 years. Said, I ain' gonna leave none of my folks, and we didn't leave in Hayneville. That's the first place I went to vote.

Plenty folks was scared to vote. I wasn't scared, but I didn't vote unless he told me. He dead now, but lotta folks lef' and wouldn't vote.

Yeah, me and John Jackson were together.
